Message from the Health Commissioner

Dear Community Partners,

I am pleased to report that the Carroll County General Health District (CCGHD) has continued to stabilize and move forward in a positive direction. Our key priorities for 2019 were to continue to remain financially stable, strengthen the Environmental Division, develop our Strategic Plan, complete the required tri-annual Community Health Assessment (CHA), and prepare for submission for Public Health Accreditation.

We finished the year financially sound with a year-end balance of \$367,190.12 in all funds. Thank you to the Carroll County Auditor's Office for your guidance and support.

The Environmental Division underwent many changes the second half of the year as we took our time to hire a new Director of Environmental Health, Courtney Grossman, BS, RS. Tina Marini, BS, Sanitarian in Training (SIT) became a Registered Sanitarian (RS). Myra Pancher, BS, RS retired after twenty-five years of service in public health. We hired Kevin Ayers, BS, as a new SIT. We will continue to focus our efforts in 2020 on improving our turnaround times for our services in the community. Thank you to the septic installers, service providers, septic haulers, private water system contractors, realtors, title agencies, food establishments, and all of our other licensed facilities for your feedback, suggestions, patience and support.

The CCGHD 2019-2023 Strategic Plan was developed and approved by the board. Please refer to our website for the full report.

Ohio Revised Code (ORC) 3701.981 requires local health departments to conduct a Community Health Assessment (CHA) every three years. Our last CHA was conducted in 2016 through grant funding. Those funds were no longer available for this assessment, and we couldn't have done it without the financial support of many of our community partners and anonymous donor. I want to acknowledge and thank the following supporters: Alcohol Drug Addiction & Mental Health Services Board of Tuscarawas & Carroll Counties (ADAMHS), Aultman Health Foundation, Carroll County Commissioners, Community Mental Healthcare, Mercy Medical Center, North Canton Medical Foundation, The Giving Well Family Foundation, & an anonymous donor. We will review the results of the CHA in April of 2020 with community partners in order to develop our three-year Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP).

Lastly, I am pleased to announce that we have completed all the requirements for documentation for submission to the Public Health Accreditation Board (PHAB). This is the National accrediting body for public health departments in the U.S. I cannot thank Amy Campbell, Office Administrator, and Kelly Engelhart, Director of Nursing (DON), enough for keeping us on track and leading our entire team through the process. All of our staff did an amazing job as they worked on this in addition to their normal daily duties. The accreditation process is essential in order to be able to continue applying for grant funding to support Carroll County in the future.

Thank you again to our Board of Directors, Township Trustees, Carroll County Commissioners, and the multiple county agencies for your continued guidance and support. I am humbled and honored to be able to work with you!


2019 A Year in Review... Accreditation set as a priority!


- The health department went through strategic planning and developed a new agency Strategic Plan for 2019-2023.

- A Professional Employee Retention and Moral (PERM) Committee was developed.












From 2017 to 2019 the Carroll County General Health District has had almost a 50% increase in the number of birth certificates purchased. This is largely due to the Transportation Security Administration's (TSA) new requirement of a REAL ID- compliant driver's license to be able to fly within the United States. A certified birth certificate is one of the acceptable documents to be submitted to the Bureau of Motor Vehicles for proof of full legal name, date of birth, and legal presence in the U.S.


209 middle school students were educated on the new Responsible, Social, Values Program (RSVP) that teaches students how to make healthy decisions.

Community Health programs are those funded by Grants, they include; Tobacco Prevention, Maternal Child Health, Injury Prevention, Safe Communities and Public Health Preparedness. These programs provided a Pandemic Table top exercise, Teen Rodeo for safe driving, and business education for pre-conception health to women in our workforce. Car seats are distributed free for child passenger safety and Cribs are given free to ensure safe sleep environments for our babies.



In 2019, 33 car seats were distributed by the Carroll County General Health District. Immunizations are a large portion of Nursing Services. Our local doctors do not provide immunizations in their offices, for families on Medicaid, they refer them to CCGHD. In 2019 we administered a total of 1554 immunizations to 847 people. Nearly half of those are to children under the age of 18.

We administered 312 Influenza immunizations in 2019, of those 148 were administered during the Drive thru Flu Clinic on October 3, 2019.






Nursing Services for 2019 include, Immunizations, Communicable Disease Investigations, Children with Medical Handicaps (BCMH) and general nursing services, Tuberculosis testing, lead screenings and blood pressure checks.

The Reproductive Services provided are women's annual exams, pregnancy tests, sexually transmitted diseases (STD) testing birth control, prenatal visits, and family planning education.


The Children with Medical Handicaps (BCMH) is a program to provide care coordination by public health nurses to children with special medical needs. Two of our part-time nurses provided services that included 1065 contacts and 59 home visits to 127 children in the program. The program provides additional funding to families for items necessary to support their child's medical needs, beyond what insurance will cover.

In 2019 BCMH nurses brought in \$51,570 revenue to support their specialty work.



Environmental Health


There were 1,231 Inspections done in 2019



Of the 1,231 inspections, the following inspections are not included in the graphs provided: animal bites (14), tattoo parlor (1), schools (9), mobile home parks (11), the jail (2), and no show appointments (14).

Annually, the Environmental Division collects data on the number of inspections conducted, by township, throughout the year in our multiple service areas, including food, water, sewage, point of sales, recreational facilities, and other licensed facilities. This data is summarized in the Environmental Services 2019 graph above.

From reviewing the number of complaints between 2017 through 2019, it was observed that 2018 had the most complaints in all the complaint areas, with 7 food complaints, 10 smoking complaints, and 132 nuisance complaints. Most of the nuisance complaints, 35, were in Brown Township. From the 2019 data, it was observed that the number of nuisance complaints decreased to 101 nuisance complaints, with most of them, 43, being reported in Brown Township. Brown Township has the greatest population of people in Carroll County. The Villages of Malvern and Minerva are also located in Brown Township.




